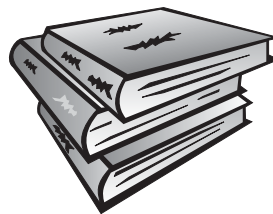

Our summer reading initiative is offered free to participants, thanks to the Friends of the Library. It includes movies, activities, and, of course, reading. Beginning June 1, participants in preschool through ninth grade can earn fun prizes and a paperback book to keep, by visiting any Library location four times before July 31.

Readers from preschool through fifth grade can explore the night with “Dream Big—READ!” while grades six through nine can participate in “Own the Night.” Older teens and adults can explore new interests in “Between the Covers,” a theme that entices readers to discover new authors and genres.

An App for That

If your life revolves around the small screen on your smart phone, then access to our Online Branch just got better. Simply install and open the Bookmyne application, available at Google Play or the Apple Store. Use the “find your library” feature to connect to the Sioux City Public Library catalog. When you enter your Library barcode number to log in, and tap the My Account tab, you can search the catalog, place holds, see what you have checked out, and renew items. The display is easy to read and the software simple to navigate.

If you haven't yet mastered your new device, bring it and your questions to the next Library Tech Talk. Technical Services Manager Troy Jennings leads how-to sessions on the 4th Tuesday of every month. Join him from 6–7:30 pm in the Wilbur Aalfs Library's SNB Conference Room (free parking after 6 pm). Tech Talks are part Q & A session and part one-on-one instruction. Attendees wanting personalized training are asked to bring their handheld devices, laptops, cables and library cards to the class. If you can't make it to a Tech Talk class, one-on-one instruction is available by appointment. Call 255-2933 x 221 for details. 📖

Family Storytime

In addition to our weekly storytimes on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, the Library is launching a Sunday afternoon session at The Wilbur Aalfs (Main) Library from April 15 through May 20.

Family Storytime is a shared story experience for children not yet in school and their parent/grandparent. In addition to the benefit of developing social skills, building vocabulary, and learning to match spoken sounds with written words, curious young minds experience the magic of stories.

Reading aloud introduces the idea that stories are worth telling, that books are worth sitting down and listening to, and that the Library is a great place to explore the world with others. Join us!

Science @ the Library

When it comes to helping curious young minds investigate the whys and hows of life, make the Library your first-stop science shop.

Library shelves hold hundreds of books that help children discover their world. Titles vary from **Cool Engineering Activities for Girls** to **Shop Tech: The Science of Cars** and **How Things Work in the Yard**. The books **Kitchen** and **Backyard** bring science alive using common items around the home, while **30 Fun Ways to Learn About Time and Money: Supporting Problem Solving, Reasoning, and Numeracy** zeros in on mathematics.

Our Science Online database at www.siouxcitylibrary.org is an awesome site for beginning or advanced exploration. (Click on Research & Databases, then Science Online, and enter your library card number.) This easy-to-use resource covers biology, chemistry, computer science, earth science, environmental science, forensic science, marine science, mathematics, physics, space & astronomy, and weather & climate. You will find diagrams, experiments, definitions, images, videos, biographies and timelines, plus "Today's Science Feature" and "Science in the News."

If hands-on exploration is more your style, the Library has that, too. In partnership with the Iowa Math and Science Education Partnership, the Library recently hosted Moms Night Out for STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) to inspire the next generation of innovators. Professors and students from Morningside College provided do-it-yourself activities for parents and their children in grades 3-7. This statewide initiative, held at 27 sites across Iowa, recognizes the important role that parents play in stimulating a child's imagination and inspiring them to explore the sciences.

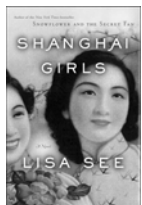
The Library shares the goal that cultivating critical thinkers is important. A peek at the Library's summer calendar reveals science learning activities in partnership with the Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center, Sanford Planetarium, and the Science Center of Iowa. Star Lab, Nocturnal Animals, Dream Like a Scientist, The Night Sky & Native American Legends, and Legos @ the Library, with support from Target Stores, will offer exciting opportunities for the scientifically inclined.

Imagine. Discover. Connect. Books are just the beginning. 📖

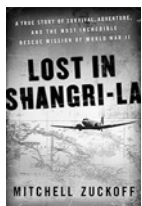
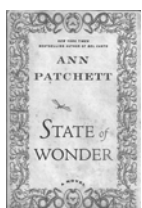

POPULAR READ-ALIKES



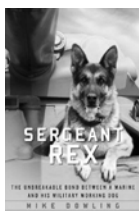
If you liked the novels **Shanghai Girls** and **Dreams of Joy** by Lisa See, try **Girl in Translation** by Jean Kwok. An emigrant from Hong Kong leads a double life: exceptional schoolgirl during the day, Chinatown sweatshop worker in the evenings. With the weight of her family's future on her shoulders and a secret love for a factory boy on her mind, Kimberly must constantly translate not just her language but also herself back and forth between the worlds she straddles.



If you enjoy a strong sense of place, like the exotic Amazon jungle depicted in **A State of Wonder** (New Fiction Pat), try **Lost in Shangri-la** (New Nonfiction 940.548 Zuc) by Mitchell Zuckoff. This true story follows a plane crash in Dutch New Guinea during WWII and the painstaking task of evacuating three injured survivors while avoiding trouble with superstitious natives. **Saving Fish from Drowning** a novel by Amy Tan, involves the disappearance of American tourists along the equally inhospitable Burma Road in present day Myanmar. All three explore the consequences that arise when cultures collide.



Rin Tin Tin: The Life and the Legend (New Nonfiction 636.737 Orl) by Susan Orlean includes the fame of Rinty and his offspring in film, radio and television, the elevation of dogs from outdoor workers to beloved family members, the rise of obedience training schools, and the use of dogs in the military. For more on that latter note, try **Soldier Dogs: The Untold Story of America's Canine Heroes** (New Nonfiction 355.424 Goo) by Maria Goodavage. To read about an amazing German Shepherd in 2004 Iraq, check out **Sergeant Rex: The Unbreakable Bond between a Marine and His Military Working Dog** (New Nonfiction 956.7044) by Mike Dowling.



Jeannette Walls created a sensation with her nomadic childhood and dysfunctional parents in **The Glass Castle** (362.292 Wal). Her story is reminiscent of **The Next Better Place: A Father and Son on the Road** (306.87422 Kei), written by Michael Keith about his hitchhiking days with an alcoholic parent, also from the early 1960s. For a more recent account of children taking charge for self-preservation, try **An Invisible Thread: The True Story of an 11-year-old Panhandler, a Busy Sales Executive, and an Unlikely Meeting with Destiny** (New Nonfiction 974.71 Sch) by Laura Schroff.



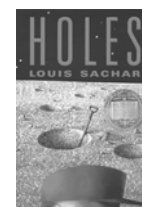
AWARD-WINNERS TO LOVE AT ANY AGE

With their well-written and creative story lines, these Newbery Medal winners are great reads for adults, too!

For a sense of place, try **Moon Over Manifest** (J Van) by Clare Vanderpool. Twelve-year-old Abilene is sent to stay with an old friend of her father's in 1936 Manifest, Kansas and hopes to learn something about his past.



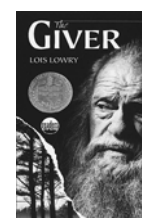
A clever plot resolution makes **Holes** (J Sac) by Louis Sachar a delightful read. Stanley Yelnats is sent to a hellish correctional camp in the Texas desert where he finds his first real friend, a treasure, and a new sense of himself.



The Graveyard Book (YA Gai) by Neil Gaiman tells the coming-of-age story of Nobody Owens who, as an orphaned toddler, is raised by foster ghosts and other cemetery denizens. At 14, he must destroy the leader of a secret order or become its latest victim. Magical, terrifying, and filled with breathtaking adventures, the end will leave you hungering for a sequel.



The Giver (J Low) by Lois Lowry is, in a word, riveting. Described as one of the most thought-provoking novels for children ever written, the main character faces a dilemma after discovering the terrible truth about the perfect society in which he lives.
